BRUCE PENINSULA NATIONAL PARK

Best for: Exploring uniquein-Ontario landscapes, with limestone cliffs plunging down to the Caribbean-blue waters of Georgian Bay. Great hikes: Canada's oldest and longest marked hiking route - the Bruce Trail extends from Niagara to the Bruce Peninsula. Day hiking? Walk to the dramatic rock formations at the Grotto. Best beach: Singing Sands on the Lake Huron shore. Did you know? More than 40 varieties of orchids bloom in the park. Where to stay: Settle into a park yurt or camp overlooking Cyprus Lake. What's nearby: The town of Tobermory has plenty of motels, shops and places to eat. Hungry? Tobermory's Little Tub Bakery has decadently gooey butter tarts. pc.gc.ca facebook.com/LittleTubBakery

KILLBEAR PROVINCIAL PARK

Best for: Canoeing or kayaking between pink granite cliffs and swimming at sandy bay beaches. What else to do: Check out park nature programs, including "snake talks" featuring live reptiles. Most romantic sunsets: See them from Sunset Rocks or Harold's Point. **Did you know?** Killbear's peak time for fall colour is early October. Where to stay: Killbear has 881 campsites, but if you're not a camper, sleep in Parry Sound, less than an hour's drive. What's nearby: Sounds of music take over Parry Sound during the popular annual Festival of the Sound (July 18 through August 10). Hungry? Tuck into Georgian Bay pickerel or whitefish at Gilly's Snug Harbour Restaurant. ontarioparks.com/park/killbear



ALGONQUIN AND BEYOND

5 GREAT ONTARIO PARKS

Algonquin Provincial Park is one of Ontario's most popular wilderness escapes: a 763,000-hectare (1,884,610 acre) expanse of pine forests, lakes and rivers offering some of the province's best hiking and canoe trips. But with 300 provincial parks, 5 national parks and 2 national marine conservation areas, Ontario has lots more destinations for outdoor enthusiasts, whether you're an experienced back-country adventurer or a novice outdoorsperson. Here are 5 of our favourite places to get outdoors

QUETICO PROVINCIAL PARK

Best for: Canoeing past rocky cliffs, waterfalls and pine forests, many accessible only via the park's 2,000 lakes. Great view: Climb the French Falls Trail to the French River cascades. Where to stay: Sleep in a yurt, or choose from more than 100 campsites at Dawson Trail Campground on French Lake. Special events: During Wilderness Weekend (June 27-30). learn about orienteering, kayaking and canoe-tripping. What's nearby: In Thunder Bay, visit Fort William Historical Park, a living history experience of 19th-century furtrading days, or order a plate of traditional Finnish pancakes at Hoito Restaurant. ontarioparks.com/park/quetico queticopark.com

KILLARNEY PROVINCIAL PARK

Best for: Hiking spectacular granite and quartzite mountain ridges. Swimming or paddling in the 50-plus clear lakes. Great hike: Make the challenging climb through massive boulders at The Crack for panoramic views.

Where to stay: Book a waterfront site - or a yurt - in family-friendly George Lake Campground. Or choose a lodge or B&B in the town of Killarney. What's nearby: If you're new to outdoor adventuring, try out the Learn to Camp or Learn to Fish programs at nearby Grundy Lake Provincial Park. ontarioparks.com/park/killarney ontarioparks.com/learntocamp

FRONTENAC PROVINCIAL PARK

Best for: Day hiking the 100-plus kilometres of trails along the rocky Canadian Shield. Great hikes: Watch for beaver ponds on the Bufflehead Trail. For a lakeside hike, follow the Doe Lake Loop. Special events: Refresh your outdoor skills at a wilderness workshop – try introductory canoe tripping, first aid or outdoor gourmet cooking. Where to stay: Frontenac has 48 back-country campsites. Find less rugged accommodations in Kingston. less than an hour's drive. ontarioparks.com/park/frontenac frontenacpark.ca tourism.kingstoncanada.com



Take the Parkbus

You don't need a car to reach many of Ontario's parks. Ride the Parkbus, a non-profit transportation service that runs from Toronto to Algonquin, Killarney, Bruce Peninsula and other provincial parks on select summer weekends.

1 CN TOWER (TORONTO)

See Toronto's incredible views, from 346 metres (1,134 ft.) at the LookOut Level and through the tower's glass floor. On the Himalamazon motion theatre ride, feel the wind and water of the imaginary land where Super-Trees grow. TIP: Book early for EdgeWalk, a harnessed stroll on the ledge around the tower's main pod – it can sell out.

2 CANADA'S WONDERLAND (VAUGHAN)

The new Wonder Mountain's Guardian is a 4D fantasy ride ending in a dragon's lair! Dinosaurs Alive! is one of the world's largest animatronic dinosaur parks, with more than 40 life-sized animatronic dinosaurs in a Jurassic-themed setting. **TIP:** Purchase a Fast Lane wristband to skip the lineups.

3 ART GALLERY OF ONTARIO (TORONTO)

The AGO's new Kids' Gallery has childfriendly text panels and works hung at kid height, plus exhibit-related fun like dress-up and drawing stations. Dropin Playtime for the under-5 set has costumes, puppets, blocks, arts and crafts. **TIP**: At caféAGO, kids 5 and under eat free (when a parent spends \$12 or more). **ago.net**

4 RIPLEY'S AQUARIUM OF CANADA (TORONTO)

This hot new kid magnet has 450 species, from the largest shark collection in North America to one of the best jellyfish exhibits in the world. A glass viewing tunnel looks into the shark lagoon. **TIP:** Aim for weekday mornings to beat the crowds. Bring snacks or line up early for lunch, as tables are limited. **ripleyaquariums.com/canada**

5 NIAGARA FALLS

Catch some serious views of the iconic Niagara Falls and the Niagara Region from a whirlybird's-eye-view with Niagara Helicopters. For a close-up view of the Falls, get wet on the new Hornblower Niagara Cruises catamaran boat tour. **TIP**: Work in time to visit Niagara Falls trippy attactions, including haunted houses and wax museums kids love. **niagarahelicopters.com**

6 CALYPSO (LIMOGES)

Just 30 minutes from Ottawa and boasting Canada's largest wave pool and the highest waterslide tower in North America, Calypso has more than 35 waterslides and 100 water games. Kongo Expedition is the new African-themed adventure river; Zoo Lagoon appeals to the littlest visitors. **TIP**: Buy tickets online and download a park map to beat lineups. Only personal flotation devices are permitted for children (no water wings). **calypsopark.com**

7 SCIENCE NORTH (SUDBURY)

In Science North's 30th year, learn to fly a DeHavilland Beaver floatplane (in a simulator), catch *To Space and Back* at the Planetarium and watch Wonders of the Arctic 3D in the IMAX theatre. Visitors can also pan for gold and explore mining tunnels in the Underground Tour at Dynamic Earth. **TIP:** Kids under 5 will love the TD Canada Trust Toddler's Treehouse. **sciencenorth.ca**

B FORT HENRY (KINGSTON)

Get a glimpse of 19th-century life at this War of 1812-era fortress, which offers guided tours, historical demos and great views of the 1000 Islands. It's part of Ontario's only UNESCO World Heritage Site! **TIP:** Kids love the Ghosts of the Fort tour offered by the Haunted Walk. Don't miss Fort William Historical Park in Thunder Bay and Fort York in Toronto.

9 THE BLUE MOUNTAINS

Zip between soaring platforms on Wind Rider Triple Zips, and navigate suspension bridges, ladders and nets at Timber Challenge High Ropes or cross a suspension bridge and tour secret caverns at nearby Scenic Caves Nature Adventures. 
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BIG FAMILY ADVENTURES

In the vintage beach town of Port Dover, sun-worshippers recline beneath imported palm trees and stand-up paddleboarders ply the calm waters. A block away, at the Erie Beach Hotel, The Cove dining room has been serving a legendary Lake Erie perch lunch for much of its 70 years: the crispy-breaded fish is today-fresh but the menu is straight from the Mad Men-era (a salad cart laden with lemon-horseradish jelly, homemade pickles and a salad of mandarin oranges with pineapple, coconut and sour cream – just ask for recipes). It's a taste of Ontario summer on a plate. portdover.ca/tourism

Here are some more not-to-be-missed Ontario beach experiences to chew on this summer



BEST URBAN BEACH:

Sugar Beach, Lake Ontario (Toronto) View: Can you believe, standing on sugar-white sand beside a pink umbrella overlooking Lake Ontario, that this used to be a parking lot? In the shadow of skyscrapers and the Redpath Sugar Factory, the world's first intentional industrial beach (no swimming here) has been a big hit with design aficionados. Who: Couples stroll along the promenade, kids play in the spray of the maple-leaf-shaped water feature and office escapees lunch on the candy-striped rocks. waterfrontoronto.ca

BEST FOR FAMILIES:

Victoria Park Beach, Lake Ontario (Cobourg) View: "Mom, Dad, there's a dragon on the beach," shouts one youngster. His sister spots a rhinoceros and his parents point to a nearly life-sized castle, created by master sculptors at the annual Sandcastle Festival (August 2). Complete with boardwalk, bandshell and ice-cream shops, this is the charming small-town beach of your dreams. Who: Kids of all ages enjoying the splash pad, slides and swings; grown-ups dipping into lively, charming downtown Cobourg.







"Sandbanks Provincial Park is a great beach with spectacular sand dunes – one of the first reasons for tourism in this region, even before the food and wine became a draw. When my family comes to visit from Europe that's one of the first things that they want to see."

BEST BEACH FOR WATER SPORTS: Port Stanley Beach, Lake Erie (Port Stanley)

View: The onshore breeze whips the warm waves of Lake Erie into the frothy white caps that are like candy to the windsurfers and kite surfers who flock here. Who: While extreme athletes ply the waters of Main Beach, families with small children flock to the shallow waters of Little Beach. Rail enthusiasts head inland to catch a ride on a real 1940s London and Port Stanley car. portstanley.net


BEST BEACH FOR WILDLIFE: The Pinery Provincial Park, Lake Huron (Grand Bend)

View: Cyclists might spot fawns cavorting in the forest, beavers busy at work or even a flying squirrel swoop overhead before catching a sunset that National *Geographic* once called one of the 10 best in the world. Who: Zoology and geology buffs (for the tall, freshwater dunes) and sun-seekers alike flock here to camp, swim and marvel. pinerypark.on.ca

BEST BEACH TO HAVE TO YOURSELF: Katherine's Cove, Lake Superior (Sault Ste. Marie)

View: Make a point of seeking out sleek Bathtub Island, where warm water pools around the shallow, sandy bottom. Who: You, and very few other people: about 90 minutes north of Sault Ste. Marie on the north shore of Lake Superior is one of Ontario's most remote and beautiful beaches.





View: The toughest decision of the day is whether to set up your chair facing the jet skiers on Georgian Bay, or toward Beach Drive, where cars cruise past packed patios and the peoplewatching is sublime. Who: Up to 2 million fun-loving people each year, with some of the best crowds for Beach Fest and Kite Fest. wasagabeach.com

BEST SUNSETS:

Grand Bend Beach. Lake Huron (Grand Bend)

View: With a near-perfect western exposure, the calm surface of Lake Huron seems to catch fire as the massive orange summer sun dips beneath the horizon. Who: Stand at the foot of Grand Bend's Main Street or on the rocking patio at Gables to watch a communal sunset – or make like the couples and shutterbugs who sneak off for private views along almost 50 kilometres (31 mi.) of beaches. grandbend.com grandbendtourism.com













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TAKE THE BAIT

If you love to dangle a line in the water, there are many places in Ontario where you can enjoy your sport. While some are end-of-trail hotspots, others are mysteriously right beside the busiest highways. Here are some of my favourites

BEST DIY FAMILY VACATION: Merkel's Lodge on Wabigoon Lake is a scant kilometre drive off the Trans-Canada Highway. It offers quaint lakeside cabins where you can cook your own catch in privacy. Great shallowwater fishing for plentiful

walleye, pike, bass and musky. I witnessed a 10-year-old catch a trophy smallmouth bass right off the dock. merkelscamp.com

BEST HISTORIC FISHING: Dr. John Cook caught the worldrecord brook trout

on the Nipigon River in 1915 (6.5 kg/14.5 lbs.). The Prince of Wales made a junket there a few years later to try to better that (he didn't, but he did catch a bunch of brook trout as long as a royal arm). I'm an old Nipigon River guide myself and can attest to the river's historic majesty (but no, the Prince wasn't my client). nipigonriveradventures.com

BEST END-OF-TRAIL ADVENTURE:

Old Post Lodge on Highway 599 is about as far north in Ontario as you can drive. A shuttle boat whisks guests across Lake St. Joseph to the lodge. Great fishing, food, guides and accommodations await you at this once-historic Hudson's Bay Company trading post. My daughter, Erin, caught and released a 104-cm (41 in.) pike there on a fly rod. oldpost.com

BEST FLY-IN-END-OF-TRAIL ADVENTURE: The Sutton River

flows through 95 remote kilometres (59 mi.) of the Hudson Bay Lowlands through Polar Bear Provincial Park near Cape Henrietta Maria, where Hudson Bay and James Bay meet. I've fished there twice, and saw polar bears, seals, caribou and thousands of geese - and caught more fish than I could count. The best brook trout fishing in the world. hearstair.com

BEST FLY-IN FISHING: Wilderness North makes it easy to fly É T in from Thunder Bay to one of five full-service lodges or eight outposts in the remote waters near Wabakimi Provincial Park in Northern Ontario. If you want fine dining in an all-frills lodge, pan-frying your own catch in a remote outpost, or something in between, you'll find it. wildernessnorth.com

BEST FLY-FISHING MECCA:

Only a couple of hours west of Toronto, the Grand River is a flyfishing paradise where chunky brown trout sip dainty flies off the surface of this easily waded, fertile, fly-fishing-only river. Top guides offer casting and catching lessons here. include tubing the Elora Gorge, rock climbing at Rattlesnake Point or visiting the Royal Botanical Gardens. Quaint bed-and-breakfasts abound. grindstoneangling.com

BEST LUXURY FISHING:

Treat yourself to a trip aboard the 25-metre (82 ft.) luxury yacht the Grace Anne II while you tour beautiful Lake of the Woods. There's top-shelf accommodations, dining, and of course fishing here: walleye, smallmouth, pike and musky Adjacent après-fishing activities abound. This trip is on my bucket list!

Eastern Ontario has become an epicentre for fine local beer, with more than two dozen artisan breweries (many of them new) in a three-hour driving radius. One brewmaster says the Ottawa-area scene is "a brotherhood, a sisterhood... it's for the love of beer." Here are a few places to whet your whistle



CLOCKTOWER BREW PUB AND CRAFT BREWERY

Clocktower Brew Pub in Ottawa is concentrating on becoming a neighbourhood brewery. Brewmaster Patrick Fiori works with an executive chef to create beer-infused dishes. Although the brewing operations are not open for tours, restaurant patrons can enjoy upscale pub fare at any of the four locations across the city. clocktower.ca

BIG RIG BREWERY Chris Phillips of the Ottawa Senators is a part owner of this new brewery and restaurant in Ottawa's west end. He's not just a silent partner, though: Brewmaster Lon Ladell says the NHL defenceman's farm in the Ottawa suburb of Manotick was home to some hops that were used for one of Big Rig's seasonal beers in 2013. Patrons of all ages can take a peek through large windows from the bar or restaurant at the brewing process. bigrigbrew.com



KICHESIPPI

Kichesippi is hoping to become the official beer of Ottawa. "We're never going to be Canada-wide. We want people to say that if you're visiting from out of town, you have to have a Kichesippi," co-owner Paul Meek says. Although beer is the focus, it also has a line of sodas available for kids, teens and non-beer drinkers. kbeer.ca



What is craft beer?

Harper's Burger Bar: Kingston's pride, made with local, sustainable beef and served with Yukon Gold fries, Signature: Toss-up between the Umami burger with brie and the Smokehouse with applewood cheddar. TIP: You can replace your bun with two grilled-cheese sandwiches or get waffle-cut cheese fries on the side. harpersburgerbar.com

Reggie's Hot Grill: Everything from beef to bun is local at this Peterborough joint. Signature: An extra-lean beef patty garnished with a fried egg, mozzarella and cheddar plus crispy bacon. TIP: Food Network's John Catucci (You Gotta Eat Here host) loved it! pepper-jack.com

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BARLEY DAYS

Located in the wine-centric region of Prince Edward County, Barley Days Brewery honours the rich agricultural history of the region. One of its highlights is a vin ale brewmaster Alex Nichols combines beer and wine (aged in wine barrels) with champagne yeast. The brewery has a retail shop and offers tours. barleydaysbrewery.com

BEAU'S ALL NATURAL BREWING CO. The pride of little Vankleek Hill (population 1,800) is Beau's – a craft beer trailblazer in Eastern Ontario. The name Beau's stems from Beauchesne, the surname of the family that owns the brewery. The co-founder, Steve, says Ottawa was hungry for a local brewery when it launched in 2006. It's open seven days a week for tours and perusing its on-site retail shop. beaus.ca

Perfect Pairings

Talk about perfect pairings: Beer and burgers were made for each other. Here are a few favourites

The Burger's Priest: Created by a burger aficionado and onetime seminarian, this cult Toronto brand (three locations) is "redeeming the burger one at a time." Signature: Diner-style thin, griddled patties with good old processed cheese. TIP: Order from the secret menu (online). thehurgerspriest com

Weber's: Now a Muskoka landmark, this spot on Highway 11 has been a busy cottage-country nosh stop since they first opened their doors back in 1963. Signature: Charcoal-grilled like few remaining places do these days. TIP: Buy a "bucket" (12-stack of patties) here, or find them at Ontario grocery stores. webers.com

Carrie's Corner: Long popular with Thunder Bay locals, the burgers - and this tiny corner café are unpretentious, homemade and delicious. Signature: The Coney Burger is like a giant meatball on a bun (order it with cheese). TIP: Carrie's also makes great perogies. 807-768-1104



PERTH BREWERY

Perth Brewery is enjoying lots of early success as an arm of Perth Brewing Co. In a can'tmiss location next to a busy eatery on Highway 7 in Perth, the family behind the venture is hoping to expand the brand into several restaurants in nearby Ottawa, according to co-owner Cathy Brown. It has more than 10 beers available for purchase, and it sponsors many festivals and events in the area throughout the summer. perthbrewing.ca

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
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




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
